

MD's note

They do not have any special secret recipe or highly paid staff either. Certainly, they do not know what food tastes right for me, but somehow the taste is always mouthwatering.

I think the taste comes from the undeniable fact that in these large kitchens we are given food prepared by people willing to serve. When I used to visit as a young boy, there were a few hundreds of people eating daily, the numbers have since grown to thousands and they also serve food round the clock. While the food has not changed much, the way it is prepared has undergone a drastic change: from wood-fired cooking of the olden days they have modernised to cooking by steam, electricity or gas; from handmade bread and sweets, they have moved over to machines that churn out these delicacies in thousands daily. They have adapted beautifully to the increase in visitors by bringing in technology that ensures not only that everyone is served but also that the food remains faithful to its original taste. Most importantly, the people behind these new machines too work with the same old joy that was derived from being in service to the community.

It's mindsets that differentiate organisations. Success comes from the mindset that we are here to serve the community around us. Be it our clients or employees or vendors or charterers or the ports that our ships call at. When we just make a service offering neither will we grow nor will the people associated with us be happy. When we adapt to change with the right technology, we will grow. And as long as we are willing to serve, we will have a happy and satisfied community around us. Let us continue to be willing to serve to the best of our abilities and adapt timely to the changes with technology that puts smiles on the faces of everyone who interacts with us.

Workshop on "Voluntary Environmental Compliance Plan and Resilience"

In our pursuit of excellence, Synergy is constantly striving to be a leader in all aspects of ship management.

Protection of the environment has been our prevalent endeavour, in line with which we underwent a voluntary Shipping MRV carbon emissions verification, conducted by Verifavia (a worldwide independent accredited environmental verification and auditing body). This further emphasised our commitment to reduce the environmental impact of our vessels.

VECP workshops have also been conducted regularly in Chennai, Manila and Delhi.

A workshop themed 'Voluntary Environmental Compliance Plan and Resilience' was held in New Delhi recently to benefit our seafarers from the National Capital Region. The resoundingly successful two-day workshop was facilitated by Mr Brijesh Bassi and Capt. Sudarshan.

The workshop started with an Introduction to Company's VECP. Synergy's policy of 'Zero Tolerance' towards deliberate MARPOL violations was reiterated.

The interactive session on 'Overview of MARPOL' covered various discharge criteria under all the Annexes of MARPOL. The participants were so involved that they could be seen discussing different aspects of VECP even during the breaks. Capt. Sudarsan elaborated on the Vessel General Permit, OPA 90, APHIS regulation. Mr Bassi discussed various case studies on MARPOL Violation and he emphasised in no uncertain words the importance of record keeping and maintenance of ORB and GRB. The attendees too put forth the practical challenges faced by seafarers, which were then discussed in detail.

Day 2 was dedicated entirely to 'Resilience', Mr Bassi discussed various ways of coping with pressure and stress during adverse circumstances onboard.





An update from our new-building site team





The 'seascape' of the maritime world is changing, with modern-day changes occurring at a faster pace with new environmental regulations and ever changing commercial demands, creating new conditions for shipping which may not be met by current vessels.

The changing modern maritime world requires ships to evolve equally fast which means that changes are made in one's approach to the initial process; Project Management and Site Supervision.

In the initial phases of a new

building project, the naval architects assist in writing a suitable outline performance specification based on the shipowners requirement. After which a stringent evaluation of shipyards is done and once the right shipyard is selected starts a process which over the next year or so would see the most beautiful ships being built from scratch - the process involves the steel cutting, Keel-Laying, Launching & Delivery of the vessel. On a non-technical note - these milestones also mark the stages at which the part payments of the ship are made!

It requires tremendous effort

from all the concerned parties to build a quality ship from the Steel cutting event, and involves welding lengths of structure and pipe length's which run into several kilometers if measured with a tape. Site supervisors check the compliance of structure with approved drawings, Welds at critical joints are NDT tested for weld soundness, all the compartments are tested for tightness, hull and tanks are blasted and painted, piping, electrical cables, machineries are all installed and onboard tests carried out prior sea trial. Site team ensures that the shipyard rectifies all the

observations/ deficiencies prior the timely delivery of vessel. It is therefore of paramount importance to have a well experienced and qualified site team during construction of vessels.

Synergy ventured into project management/newbuilding supervision in 2014 with the aim of providing the following services-

· Concept Design - To incorporate Clients idea to Concept & Analysis - Evaluation of the shipyard and contract assessment

·Yard Assessment – Evaluation of the shipyard and contract

assessment

·Plan Approval – Technical review to check the compliance with latest rule requirement & to incorporate operational convenience

·Site Supervision - A customized team consisting qualified and experienced professionals for site supervision and reporting ·Guarantee Claims - To handle

·Guarantee Claims – To handle GC on behalf of ship owners if requested

We are presently engaged in multiple new building projects. We have been also involved in Model tests of some of new generation gas carriers. In order to take forward our commitment towards greener ships, we recommended to fit Mewis ducts which not only contributed in reducing the carbon foot print but also made the ships fuel efficient up to 7.5%.

National Conference on Bulk Packaging – Capt. Mundath presents the maritime perspective!



Capt. Krishna Mundath (Marine Manager – CMS, Singapore Marine SMSL) spoke at the National Conference on "Bulk Packaging of Hazardous Goods for Export, Un Certificate and Globally Harmonized System (GHS) of Classification and Labelling of Chemicals" held in Chennai recently.

He presented the maritime perspective at the conference which was appreciated by the attendees comprising shippers, packaging unit representatives, consignees, customs and maritime & civil aviation professionals. He emphasised on the importance of safe carriage of dangerous goods citing infamous maritime disasters associated with dangerous goods. He reiterated the need for good packaging and adherence to the packing standards in the IMDG code.



Where empathy thrives

As a competency management superintendent, I get the opportunity to interact with scores of seafarers on a regular basis. In fact, the competency management team has collectively interviewed more than two and a half thousand seafarers within a span of one year. As a result, I have experienced first-hand, an essential element of Synergy's guiding values, "Empathy", driving and directing us, day in and day out.

Before I give a few examples of same, let me first dwell on the concept of "Empathy", which is central to our guiding values (Safety-Empathy-Integrity) in Synergy. Many understand empathy as being same as sympathy. But is it the same?

What exactly is empathy?

Psychologist/Philosopher Theodor Lipps who dealt with the issue of empathy in the 20th century is considered by some as the founder of the concept of empathy. He used the word "Einfühlung" in German, which was later translated as empathy.

It means "in-feeling" or "feeling into" and was used by Vischer to explore human capacity to appreciate a piece of art or literature from the point of view of the artist, and feel his emotions! Empathy, sympathy, apathy and antipathy, all these words share the Greek root "pathos" which means emotion, feeling, suffering, pity, etc., but they all have different meanings though empathy and sympathy are often used interchangeably.

But neither in language nor Psychology there is any unified definition of the concept of "Empathy"!!

Without delving into the complicated jargon and concepts of psychology, we can very well conclude that an organisation or a person with high levels of empathy is an entity or someone who not only understands/recognises the explicit and implicit content of messages or emotions of the other person but also creates conditions ideal for his personal growth and empowers him along the way.

Empathy, like the concept of "quality", is nourished and nurtured by commitment from top management thus inspiring each member of the organization.

Thus, from competency management team, while we encourage seafarers to give their best and advise them, their training needs, we also try to ensure that our Masters and Chief Engineers on board and superintendents ashore, do not end up with serious inconveniences due to lack of skills /knowledge /aptitude or poor attitude of their team members.

Even as a member of shore staff working in Synergy office for more than a year now, I see a remarkable emphasis by our managing director on free thinking, uninhibited sharing of thoughts/ideas and absolutely no encouragement to "my way or the highway" kind of culture ,while laying great stress on quality, CSR activities and team work.

In my role as competency management superintendent, I have been pleasantly surprised at the number of opportunities Synergy provides to seafarers from underprivileged backgrounds. But never has it been "charity". These seafarers have displayed enormous grit and determination to emerge from tough circumstances.

I have interviewed several such indomitable characters. While many come from low-income families, there have been instances when I have come across seafarers who have wonderfully coped up with overwhelming tragedies to begin or resume their careers at sea.

The number of opportunities that Synergy has given to ratings to grow into officers is also something which has been very astonishing for me. And almost all of them have proved their mettle.

Hence, I honestly think, that Synergy is one organisation where you can see "empathy" at work in its real sense.





By the person who comes to know whose beloved is no more while he is at mid of Ocean.


By the person who gets engaged to a pretty gorgeous girl and sees the calendar to get her hand hold together.

Nagasaki memoirs

I was recently a part of the 'takeover crew of the Fairchem Cutlass, which is a 19985 DWT chemical tanker and was built at the Fukuoka Shipbuilding Yard in Nagasaki.

During World War II, the American atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki made Nagasaki the second and, to date, last city in the world to experience a nuclear attack and for some reason this thought lingered on to my mind even as we arrived Nagasaki, 25 days before the actual delivery of the vessel.

The next four weeks were extremely hectic for all of us, and we found more than 200 minor defects which were rectified by the yard prior delivery of the vessel, I must mention here that the yard staff were highly professional and were also extremely co-operative. Their safety standards and discipline were something worth emulating.

Capt. Ram Mahesh Nair, 2/E Mr. Chandra D, C/O Mr. Sandeep Chouhan and myself were part of the takeover team. Mr. Jeevan Gadre (Synergy Navis, Pune) and Capt. Thomas (Synergy Marine, Singapore)

provided us with invaluable support and guidance during the yard stay.

We did find some time to explore Nagasaki, and also visited the Atomic Bomb Museum. It's a beautiful city, and it is sheer resilience, hard work and discipline of the people of Japan which has brought them out of destruction from that fateful day in 1945 to being an economic powerhouse of the world - hats off!

'Whale' of a time

Many of us reading this magazine have spent a considerable amount of our working life in, or closely connected with the marine environment. Most of us who have sailed, have seen a whale, but except for the momentary excitement, know nothing about these stately, intelligent, graceful and majestic creatures that, for aeons have traversed the mighty oceans singing their whale songs and dancing to the beat of the waves.

I had the very rare experience of witnessing hundreds of these amazing creatures at close quarters during my last vessel's South African call recently.

It was an experience of a lifetime to observe these magnificent giants and so amazed was I that have put together the information below for the readers of Foghorn!

Introduction to Right Whales -

Right whales are the rarest of all marine mammal species. It is widely believed that the right whale populations first split because of the joining of Americas. The rising temperatures at the equator then created a second split, into the northern and southern groups, preventing them from interbreeding. Right whales cannot cross the warm equatorial waters because they have thick layers of insulating blubber which make it impossible for them to dissipate their internal body heat. These beautiful animals are slow swimmers and float when killed, making them the "Right Whale" to hunt which suggests from where they got the name.

The Southern Right Whale-

They are distinguished from others by wart-like bumps on its head, the pattern of which is used to identify individuals. The head is about a third its size. It has a broad back without a dorsal fin and a long arching mouth that begins above the eye. The tail is broad, deeply notched with a smooth trailing edge. The flippers are also broad but relatively short. Its skin is dark grey or black, occasionally with some white patches on the belly. Little data is available on their life span which is believed to be between 60 and 100 years.

Worldwide, the historical abundance of these whales was estimated at 60,000. Today the population is estimated around 10,000 and is spread throughout the southern hemisphere from temperate to polar latitudes (20° and 70° S). They migrate within this range between lowlatitude winter breeding grounds and higher latitude feeding grounds. They spend summer in the far Southern Ocean close to Antarctica, feeding and migrate north in winter to breed and can be seen off the coasts of Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Chile, Namibia, Mozambique, Peru, Tristan de Cunha, Uruguay, Madagascar, New Zealand and South Africa.

Climate change will substantially alter ocean conditions like changes in sea surface temperature, salinity, ocean circulation, and upwelling, which in turn changes food availability, migration routes, and reproductive rates for whales.

Right whales are listed as an endangered species. Conservation efforts are on under a variety of federal and state laws, regulations, policies, plans, and strategies throughout the Southern Hemisphere. Santa Catarina, in Brazil, has been recognised as the National Right Whale Capital and holds annual Right Whale Week celebrations in September.

Uruguay's Parliament on September 4, 2013, has become the first country in the world to make all of its territorial waters a safe haven for Right whales. The good news is that Southern right whale populations are showing a slow increase since international protection in 1935.

Onam with a difference!






















A voyage to remember

All of this was planned keeping in mind the rest hours of the watch-keepers.



The next day we got our bikes fixed and rode 106km from Hua Hin to Prachuap Khiri Khan, a picturesque town which sits on a beautiful curved beach and is a small relaxed provincial town. We had a great day riding quiet country roads and we also altered our route to leave the highway and ride the beach road.

The night was spent at a hostel along a promenade facing the rocky beach.

December 26th was the ride from Prachuap Khiri Khan to Bang Saphan covering a distance of around 94 km. Cycling on this route, we encountered breathtaking views of coastline along the Gulf of Thailand. The lush green country roads were also full of plantations of fruits and rubber on either side. The well-maintained roads with clear signage's and police assistance posts at comfortable distances assured us of our safety which is always the prime concern.

December 27th we left Bang Saphan early in the morning to cycle another 100 km to Chumphon. We enjoyed the bustling street life of the town and relished seafood from different street carts. 

Our CSR Initiatives

Integrated Village Development Project

Synergy Group has selected Adigathur Panchayat in Tamil Nadu to attempt it's integrated development. Adigathur panchayat consists of 8 wards, about 2800 people and 630 households. It has a mix of communities which include cobblers, old snake charmers, nomadic communities etc.

We have been guided by the CSR departments of Tata and Bosch and the Sreenivasan Sundaram Trust at the conceptual stage. Ashoka Innovators for the Public and the Trust for Village Self Governance continue to advise us on the project.

5 people – referred to as the Village Fellows - from Adigathur have been selected through a process loosely based on the selection of Ashoka Fellows. These Village Fellows (VFs) are paid a monthly honorarium and are currently collecting data and identifying the major issues/problems. At later stages, they will help implement the solutions. A web platform only dedicated to showcase the VFs and their work has been taken up too.

One Synergy employee per VF has been assigned to assist the VFs in her/his endeavour.

For the solutions to problems identified by the VFs, initially, the Ashoka Fellows network will be tapped into. We have also invited larger players in various sectors to be a part of this initiative. Such engagements by several expert organisations like Selco, MS Swaminathan Research Foundation, TVSG, Sankara Nethralaya etc. we believe will create a sense of joint ownership. The CII Foundation has also offered to help.

It is expected that proven elements, good leadership, and a committed team for implementation will make this model replicable (with necessary adjustments) in majority of the country. The current initiative will be a 2 ½ year project, at the end of which Synergy hopes to start moving towards the goal to impact 1 % of the country's villages. The fructification of this goal, however, is expected to take at least a decade and a half.
